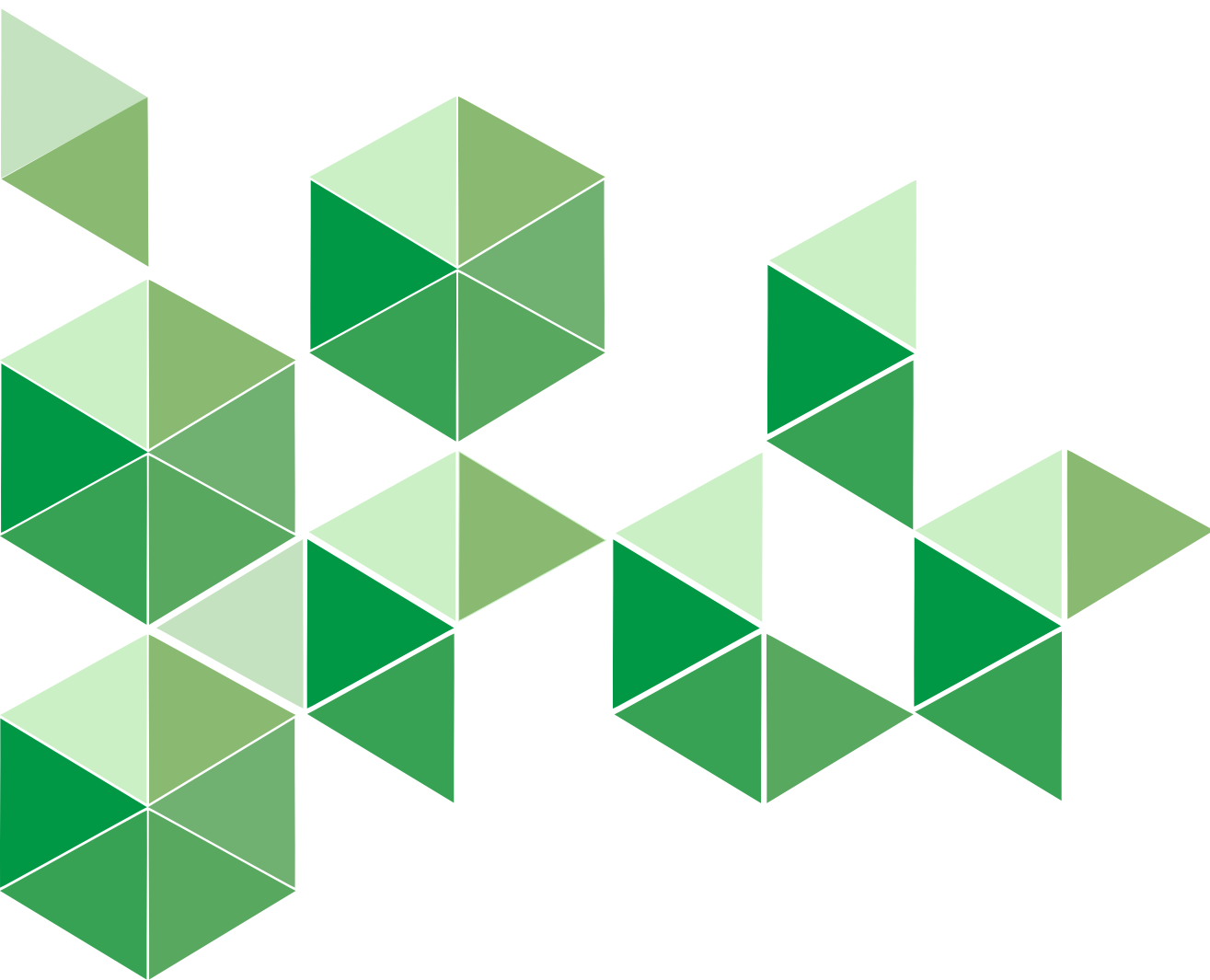

1. The relevant Explanatory Statement pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in respect of Item Nos. 6 of the accompanying Notice, is annexed hereto. Disclosure in respect of Item No. 5 of the accompanying Notice, as required pursuant to Regulation 36(3) of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI Listing Regulations") and Secretarial Standards on General Meetings (SS-2) form an integral part of this Notice.
2. Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") vide its General Circular No. 03/2025 dated 22nd September, 2025 read with circulars issued earlier on the subject ("MCA Circulars") and SEBI vide its Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CFD-PoD-2/P/CIR/2024/133 dated 03rd October, 2024 read with circulars issued earlier on the subject ("SEBI Circulars") have permitted companies to conduct Annual General Meeting ("AGM") through Video Conferencing (VC) or Other Audio Visual Means (OAVM) without physical presence of Members at a common venue, subject to compliance of various conditions mentioned therein.

In compliance with the MCA Circulars and SEBI Circulars, the provisions of the Act and the SEBI Listing Regulations, the 52nd AGM of the Company is being held through VC/OAVM. The deemed venue for the 52nd AGM will be the registered office of the Company i.e. 301, Sumer Kendra, P.B. Marg, Worli, Mumbai- 400 018.

The Notice of the 52nd AGM along with the Annual Report for Financial Year 2025-2026 is being sent by electronic mode to those Members whose email address are registered with the RTA/Company/Depositories. A copy of this Notice along with the Annual Report for Financial Year 2025-26 is uploaded on the Company's website at **www.jaysynth.com**, website of the Stock Exchange i.e. The BSE Limited at **www.bseindia.com** and on the website of Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) at **www.evotingindia.com**. Pursuant to the provisions of Regulation 36(1)(b) of the SEBI Listing Regulations, Members who have not registered their email address with the RTA/Company/Depositories, a letter containing exact web-link of the website i.e. **http://www.jaysynth.com/Jaysynthorgochem_StatutoryInformation.html** where details pertaining to the entire Annual Report is hosted is being sent at the address registered in the records of RTA/Company/Depositories. 3. **A MEMBER ENTITLED TO ATTEND AND VOTE IS ALSO ENTITLED TO APPOINT A PROXY TO ATTEND AND VOTE INSTEAD OF HIMSELF/HERSELF AND THE PROXY NEED NOT BE A MEMBER OF THE COMPANY. SINCE THIS AGM IS BEING HELD THROUGH VC/OAVM, THE REQUIREMENT OF PHYSICAL ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS HAS BEEN DISPENSED WITH. ACCORDINGLY, THE FACILITY FOR APPOINTMENT OF PROXIES BY THE MEMBERS WILL NOT BE AVAILABLE FOR THIS AGM AND HENCE THE PROXY FORM, ATTENDANCE SLIP AND ROUTE MAP OF THE AGM VENUE ARE NOT ANNEXED TO THIS NOTICE.**

4. The attendance of the Members attending the 52nd AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Act.
5. Corporate Members are required to scan and send a certified true copy of the Board Resolution, pursuant to Section 113 of the Act, authorizing their representatives to attend and vote on their behalf at the 52nd AGM through VC/OAVM. The said Resolution/ Authorization shall be sent to the Scrutinizer by e-mail through their registered e-mail address to **ritesh@cskda.com** with a copy marked to the Company on **investor.relations@jaysynth.com**
6. In case of joint members attending the 52nd AGM, only such joint holder who is higher in the order of names will be entitled to vote at the 52nd AGM.

 - i) The Company has fixed Monday, 21st September, 2026 as the 'Record date/Cut-off date' for the purpose of determining the Members who are entitled to dividend for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026.
 - ii) The dividend on Preference shares, as recommended by the Board of Directors of the Company, if approved at the 52nd AGM will be paid on or before 27th October, 2026 in respect of Preference shares held in dematerialized form, the dividend will be paid to those Members whose names are furnished by National Securities Depository Limited as beneficial owners on the Record Date and whose names appear on the Register of Members of the Company as on that Date.
 - iii) The dividend on equity shares, as recommended by the Board of Directors of the Company, if approved at the 52nd AGM will be paid on or before 27th October, 2026 in respect of equity shares held in dematerialized form, the dividend will be paid to those Members whose names are furnished by National Securities Depository Limited and Central Depository Services (India) Limited as beneficial owners on the Record Date and to those Members who hold equity shares in physical form and whose names appear on the Register of Members of the Company as on that Date.
8. Pursuant to the Finance Act, 2020, dividend income will be taxable in the hands of Members with effect from 01st April, 2020 and the Company is required to deduct tax at source from dividend paid to Members at the prescribed rates. For the prescribed rates for various categories, the Members are requested to refer to the Finance Act, 2020 and amendments thereof.
9. As per the provisions of Section 72 of the Act, the facility for making nomination is available for the Members in respect of the shares held by them. 12. Updation of PAN and other details

SEBI vide Circular dated 03rd November, 2021, 14th December, 2021 and 16th March, 2023 has mandated furnishing of PAN, KYC details (i.e. Postal Address with Pin Code, e-mail address, mobile number, bank account details) and nomination details by holders of physical securities through Form ISR-1, Form ISR-2 and Form ISR-3 (as applicable) available at **https://jaysynth.com/Jaysynthorgochem_StatutoryInformation.html**. Folios wherein any of the above cited documents/details are not available, on or after 01st October, 2023, shall be frozen as per the aforesaid circular.

The Company has sent individual letters to all the members holding shares of the Company in physical form for furnishing their PAN, KYC details and Nomination.

13. In terms of Regulation 40(1) of the SEBI Listing Regulations, as amended from time to time, transfer, transmission and transposition of securities shall be effected only in dematerialized form. In view of the same and to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and avail various benefits of dematerialization, Members are advised to dematerialize the shares held by them in physical form.
14. Members may please note that SEBI vide its Circular no. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD_RTAMB/P/CIR/2022/8 dated 25th January, 2022 has mandated Listed Companies to issue securities in demat form only while processing service requests viz. Issue of duplicate securities certificate, claim from Unclaimed Suspense Account, Renewal/ Exchange of securities certificate, Endorsement, Sub-division/ splitting of securities certificate, Consolidation of securities certificates/folios, Transmission and Transposition.

As per SEBI circular no. HO/38/13/(3)2026-MIRSDPOD/I/3763/2026 dated 30th January, 2026, the requirement of issuance of a Letter of Confirmation ("LOC") by the Company/RTA has been dispensed with for the aforesaid investor service requests with effect from 02nd April, 2026. Accordingly, securities will be credited directly to the shareholder's demat account upon submission of latest Client Master List with duly filled demat conversion request form to the RTA. In view of the same and to eliminate the risks associated with physical shares and to avail various benefits of dematerialisation, members are advised to dematerialise the shares held by them in physical form.

15. SEBI, vide Circular No. HO/38/13/11(2)2026-MIRSDPOD/I/3750/2026 dated 30th January, 2026, has opened a special window to facilitate re-lodgement of transfer and dematerialisation of physical securities. The window will remain open for a period of one year, i.e., from 05th February, 2026 to 04th February, 2027. This special facility will be available for transfer and dematerialisation of physical shares that were sold or purchased prior to 01st April, 2019. Additionally, the facility extends to transfer requests that were submitted earlier but were rejected, returned, or not attended to due to deficiencies in documents, process issues, or for any other reason. Members are informed that the securities re-lodged for transfer pursuant to the above circular, shall only be issued in demat form.
16. Members are requested to note that pursuant to the provision of Section 124 of the Act, the dividend remaining unclaimed/unpaid for a period of 7 (Seven) consecutive years from the date of its transfer to the unclaimed/unpaid dividend account of the Erstwhile Jaysynth Dyestuff (India) Limited shall be credited to the Investor Education and Protection Fund (IEPF) Authority set up by the Central Government. Members who have so far not claimed their dividends are requested to make claim with the Company immediately as no claim shall lie against the Company in respect of individual amounts once credited to the said IEPF Authority.

22. E-VOTING AND JOINING THE AGM:

- i. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of the SEBI Listing Regulations (as amended) and MCA Circulars, the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the 52nd AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized e-Voting's agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting will be provided by CDSL and the e-voting system on the date of the AGM will be provided by MUFG Intime India Private Limited (RTA).
- ii. The Company has appointed M/s. KDA & Associates, Practicing Company Secretaries, to act as a Scrutinizer to scrutinize remote e-voting process and voting at the 52nd AGM in a fair and transparent manner and they have communicated their willingness to be appointed and will be available for the same purpose.

- iii. The Consolidated Results of remote e-voting and voting at the 52nd AGM shall be declared within 2 (Two) working days of the conclusion of the 52nd AGM of the Company. The results declared along with the Scrutinizer's Report shall be placed on the Company's website **www.jaysynth.com** and on the website of Central Depository Services (India) Limited **www.evotingindia.com** and the same shall also be communicated to BSE Limited where the shares of the Company are listed.
- iv. Any person, who acquires shares of the Company and becomes Member of the Company after dispatch of the Notice of 52nd AGM along with Annual Report as on the Cut-off may obtain the login ID and password by sending a request at **helpdesk.evoting@cdslindia.com** or at **rnt.helpdesk@in.mpms.muvg.com**

- v. The results shall also be displayed on the Notice Board of the Company at the Registered Office of the Company.

A. The instructions for Members voting electronically are as under:

- i. Members who have cast their vote by remote e-voting may also attend the 52nd AGM but shall not be entitled to cast their vote again.
- ii. The remote E-voting period commences on Thursday, 24th September, 2026 (9.00 a.m. IST) and ends on Sunday, 27th September, 2026 (5.00 p.m. IST). During this period, Members of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date i.e. Monday, 21st September, 2026, may cast their vote by remote E-voting. The remote E-voting module shall be disabled by Central Depository Services (India) Limited for voting thereafter. Once the vote on a resolution is cast by the Member, the Member shall not be allowed to change it subsequently.
- iii. Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09th December, 2020, under Regulation 44 of the SEBI Listing Regulations, the Company is providing remote e-voting facility to its Members, in respect of all Members resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional members/retail members is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the Members.

The consolidated operating profit for the year was ₹ 2,201.38 Lakhs as compared to ₹ 2,255.48 Lakhs for previous year, registering a decrease of 2.40%. Net Profit after tax for the year under the review was ₹ 1,465.84 Lakhs as against ₹ 1,561.89 Lakhs in the previous financial year ended 31st March, 2025.

During FY 2025-26, the global economy recorded moderate growth despite continued challenges arising from trade tensions, policy uncertainties, evolving supply chain dynamics, geopolitical developments, and volatility across several emerging markets. Geopolitical tensions in certain regions, including West Asia, contributed to disruptions in global shipping routes and increased volatility in crude oil and petrochemical-based raw material prices, impacting manufacturing industries worldwide.

The global dyes and pigments industry continues to exhibit steady growth, supported by increasing demand from textiles, paints and coatings, plastics, packaging, printing inks, automotive, and industrial applications. The global colorants market is estimated at approximately USD 43 billion and is expected to grow at a CAGR of around 5-6% over the medium term. Growth is driven by rising consumption, product innovation, increasing focus on sustainability, and expanding industrial activity across developing economies.

The Asia-Pacific region accounts for a significant share of global demand and production, with China and India continuing to serve as major manufacturing hubs. India is increasingly being recognized as a preferred alternative sourcing destination as global customers seek to diversify supply chains and reduce dependence on any single geography. This trend presents significant opportunities for Indian colorant manufacturers with strong manufacturing capabilities, regulatory compliance standards, and customer-centric product offerings.

The Indian economy remained resilient during FY 2025-26, supported by stable macroeconomic fundamentals, sustained infrastructure investments, improving rural demand, and a favourable consumption environment. As one of the fastest-growing major economies globally, India continues to provide a positive backdrop for manufacturing and industrial sectors.

The Company operates through the following business segments:

1. Colourants & Chemicals Segment -comprising dyestuffs, pigments, pigment dispersions, inks, and textile chemicals; and
2. Inkjet Printer Segment -comprising sales, installation, servicing, and technical support of large-format inkjet printers, printer spares, and related solutions.

The Indian dyes, pigments, and specialty colorants industry remains an important constituent of the chemical sector and a significant contributor to export earnings. Demand for colorants continues to be driven by a diverse range of end-user industries including textiles, plastics, paints, coatings, printing inks, paper, packaging, and consumer goods. At the same time, increasing emphasis on sustainable manufacturing practices, environmental compliance, resource efficiency, and product traceability is reshaping industry dynamics and encouraging innovation across the value chain.

The digital printing industry continues to outperform several traditional printing segments, driven by growth in textile printing, packaging, labels, industrial printing, personalization, and sustainability-led applications. Companies engaged in digital inks, printheads, workflow solutions, software integration, and digital printing equipment are witnessing favourable long-term growth prospects.

The integration of digital printing solutions with the Company's ink manufacturing capabilities enables it to offer comprehensive solutions to customers, strengthen long-term customer relationships, and generate recurring revenue opportunities through the growing installed base of digital printing equipment.

Opportunities and Performance

The textile industry continues to be the largest consumer of colorants and remains a key growth driver for the Company's products. Rising demand for textiles, garments, home furnishings, and technical textiles, supported by increasing exports and government initiatives promoting manufacturing, is expected to sustain demand for dyes, pigments, and printing inks.

The global transition towards environmentally responsible manufacturing presents significant opportunities for innovative and sustainable colorant solutions. Customers increasingly seek products that deliver enhanced performance, regulatory compliance, lower environmental impact, and improved process efficiency.

Digital textile printing continues to gain acceptance across domestic and international markets owing to its advantages, including shorter production cycles, lower inventory requirements, customization capabilities, reduced wastage, and significantly lower water consumption compared with conventional printing methods. The increasing adoption of digital printing technologies is expected to support growth in digital inks, consumables, and associated technical services.

The Company's Digital Printing Solutions business is well-positioned to benefit from this structural shift. The expanding installed base of large-format inkjet printers is expected to drive recurring demand for digital inks, maintenance services, software solutions, colour management systems, workflow automation tools, and technical support services.

The Company continues to focus on digital pigment ink technologies that offer environmentally responsible printing solutions with minimal water consumption and reduced effluent generation. Continuous investments in product development, process improvements, and intellectual property creation remain integral to the Company's long-term growth strategy.

The pigments and pigment dispersions business also offers attractive growth opportunities driven by increasing demand from plastics, paints, coatings, packaging, construction, and industrial applications. Growing emphasis on product consistency, application-specific performance, sustainability, and regulatory compliance is expected to support demand for advanced pigment dispersion products.

During the year, the Company continued to focus on product innovation, market expansion, customer engagement, operational excellence, and cost optimization initiatives. Its diversified product portfolio and integrated business model enabled the Company to further strengthen its presence across domestic and international markets.

Standalone revenue from operations for FY 2025-26 was ₹ 25,537 Lakhs as against ₹ 22,964 Lakhs in the previous year, registering a growth of 11.20%. Export revenue for the year stood at ₹ 7,466 Lakhs as against ₹ 8,494 Lakhs in FY 2024-25, with decrease of 12.10%. Profit before tax on a standalone basis for the year was ₹ 2,082 Lakhs as compared to ₹ 2,164 Lakhs in the previous year, with decline of 3.77%. On a consolidated basis, revenue from operations for the year was ₹ 25,968 Lakhs as against ₹ 22,803 Lakhs during previous year, while consolidated profit before tax stood at ₹ 2,069 Lakhs as against ₹ 2,136 Lakhs in the previous year.

Outlook and Strategy

The long-term outlook for the colorants industry remains positive, supported by continued growth in textiles, packaging, plastics, paints, coatings, and other industrial sectors. India continues to strengthen its position as a preferred global sourcing destination for dyes, pigments, and specialty colorants, supported by its manufacturing capabilities, technical expertise, and compliance standards.

Customers across textiles, coatings, plastics, and packaging industries are increasingly demanding environmentally responsible solutions, including low-VOC colorants, heavy-metal-free pigments, bio-based dyes, water-efficient dyeing technologies, and products compliant with global environmental standards such as REACH. Consequently, manufacturers investing in sustainable technologies, green chemistry, and cleaner production processes are expected to gain competitive advantages.

The Company expects increasing adoption of digital textile printing technologies to create significant opportunities for its digital inks and digital printing solutions business. Growth in the installed printer base, coupled with rising demand for consumables, software solutions, workflow automation, colour management systems, and technical support services, is expected to contribute positively to future growth.

The Company will continue to focus on innovation, customer-centric solutions, operational excellence, sustainability initiatives, export growth, and expansion into high-value products and markets to strengthen its competitive position and create long-term value for stakeholders.

Risks and Concerns

The Company's operations are exposed to various business risks, such as volatility in prices and availability of key raw materials, intense competition in commodity product segments, changes in environmental regulations and compliance requirements, geopolitical developments and global trade disruptions, supply chain and logistics-related challenges, exchange rate fluctuations, changes in customer demand patterns and technological advancements, credit and counterparty risks, etc

The colorants industry is also witnessing increasing scrutiny regarding wastewater management, hazardous chemicals, carbon emissions, worker safety, and product traceability. Compliance with evolving sustainability standards and environmental regulations requires continuous investment in technology, processes, and monitoring systems.

The Company continuously monitors these risks and undertakes appropriate mitigation measures through prudent procurement practices, diversified sourcing, customer diversification, process improvements, effective internal controls, and comprehensive risk management systems.

Internal Control Systems and Their Adequacy

The Company has established adequate internal control systems commensurate with the nature, size, and complexity of its operations. These controls are designed to safeguard assets, ensure accuracy and reliability of financial records, promote operational efficiency, and ensure compliance with applicable laws and regulations.

The internal audit function regularly reviews operational, financial, and compliance controls across various business processes. Significant observations and recommendations are reviewed by the Audit Committee and corrective actions are implemented on a timely basis.

Human Resources and Industrial Relations

The Company firmly believes that its employees are its most valuable asset and a key contributor to sustainable growth. The Company continues to invest in employee development through training, skill enhancement, performance management, and employee engagement initiatives.

Industrial relations remained cordial and harmonious throughout the year. The Company remains committed to providing a safe, inclusive, and productive work environment that encourages innovation, teamwork, and professional growth.

NOTES TO THE STANDALONE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026**CORPORATE INFORMATION :**

Jaysynth Orgochem Limited (formerly known as JD Orgochem Limited) ('the Company') was incorporated as a public limited company having registered office at 301, Sumer Kendra, P.B. Marg, Worli, Mumbai – 400 018. The Company is engaged in manufacturing and trading of dyes, pigment, ink and trading in inkjet printers. The Company has manufacturing units at Taloja and Patalganga Maharashtra. The equity shares are listed on Bombay Stock Exchange Limited ("BSE Limited").

I. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOLLOWED :**A) Compliance with Ind AS :**

These standalone financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (herein after referred to as the 'Ind AS') as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ('Act') read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended) and relevant provisions of the Act and the guidelines issued by the Securities and Exchange Board of India ('SEBI'), to the extent applicable. The accounting policies are applied consistently for all periods presented in the financial statements.

B) Basis of preparation and presentation

The Financial Statements have been prepared on the historical cost and accrual basis except for following assets and liabilities which have been measured at fair value amount like

- i) Certain Financial Assets and Liabilities (including derivative instruments),
- ii) Defined Benefit Plans – Plan Assets
- iii) Leases
- iv) Any other item as specifically stated in respective accounting policy

C) Current and Non-Current Classification

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the Balance Sheet based on Current/ Non-Current classification. An asset is treated as Current when it is –

- Expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle;
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle;
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.
- The Company classifies all other liabilities as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

The Standalone Financial Statements have been presented in Indian Rupees (₹) (rounded off to nearest lakh), which is the Company's functional currency.

II. USE OF ESTIMATES AND JUDGMENTS

The preparation of the standalone financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires Management to make estimates, judgments and assumptions. These estimates, judgments and assumptions affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the standalone financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Examples of such estimates include useful lives of tangible and intangible assets, provision for doubtful debts, future obligations in respect of retirement benefit plans, considering the extension period for determination of lease term, etc. Accounting estimates could change from period to period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Appropriate changes in estimates are made as management becomes aware of changes in circumstances surrounding the estimates. Changes in estimates are reflected in the standalone financial statements in the period in which changes are made and, if material, their effects are disclosed in the notes to the standalone financial statements.

The estimates and judgments used in the preparation of the financial statements are continuously evaluated by the company and are based on historical experience and various other assumptions and factors (including expectations of future events) that the company believes to be reasonable under the existing circumstances, difference between actual and results and estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known/materialized.

The said estimates are based on the facts and events that existed as at the reporting date, or that occurred after that date but provide additional evidence about condition existing as at the reporting date.

III. PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

The Company had elected to continue with the carrying value of Property, Plant and Equipment ('PPE') recognized as of transition date measured as per the Previous IGAAP and use that carrying value as its deemed cost of the PPE as on the transition date.

All items of property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment, if any. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the assets to its working condition. Estimates are involved in determining the cost attributable to bringing the assets to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by the management.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognized when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during the reporting period in which they are incurred.

Spare parts procured along with the Plant and Equipment or subsequently individually which meets the recognition criteria of PPE are capitalized and added to the carrying amount of such items. The carrying amounts of those spare parts that are replaced are derecognized when no future economic benefits are expected from their use or upon disposal.

Depreciation methods, estimated useful lives and residual value.

*The company has estimated the useful life of the factory building as for 18 years on the basis of technical advice & has provided depreciation for the current year on straight line method on carrying amount as on 01st April, 2015 of that asset so that the said asset gets depreciated over its remaining useful life.

Lease hold Land is amortised over the lease period of 95 years. Depreciation on all property, plant and equipment is provided on straight line basis.

The residual values are not more than 5% of the original cost of the asset. The assets residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

Depreciation on property plant and equipment added/disposed off during the year is provided on pro rata basis with reference to the date of addition/disposal.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

IV. LEASES

The Company, as a lessee, recognises a right to use asset and a lease liability for its leasing arrangements, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset. The contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, if it involves the use of an identified asset and the Company has substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the asset and has right to direct the use of the identified asset.

The cost of the right to use asset shall comprise of the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date plus any initial direct costs incurred. The right to use assets is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation, accumulated impairment losses, if any and adjusted for any remeasurement of the lease liability. The right to use asset is depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date over the shorter of lease term or useful life of right to use asset.

The Company measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date of the lease. The lease payments are discounted by using the interest rate implicit in the lease, if that rate can be readily determined. If that rate cannot be readily determined, the Company uses incremental borrowing rate.

The company didn't recognize Right to Use and Lease liabilities for lease for which the lease terms ends within 12 months on the date of initial transition and low value assets.

As exemption is given under Ind AS 116 leases instead of recognizing a right to use asset and lease liability the payments in relation to these are recognized as an expenses in profit and loss on a straight – line basis over the lease term.

Due to transition, the nature of expenses in respect of operating leases has changed from "lease rent" to "depreciation cost" and "finance cost" for the right-to-use assets and for interest accrued on lease liability respectively, and therefore, these expenses for the current year are not comparable to the previous years, to that extent.

Company as a lessor: Leases for which the company is a lesser classified as finance lease or operating lease. Lease income from operating leases where the company is a lesser is recognized as income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

V. INVESTMENT PROPERTIES

Property that is held for long-term rental yields or for capital appreciation or both, and that is not occupied by the Company, is classified as investment properties. The Company has elected to continue with the carrying value of all of its investment property recognized as of transition date measured as per IGAAP as the deemed cost of investment property.

Upon initial recognition, an investment property is measured at cost. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment property is measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Investment properties are depreciated using the straight line method over their estimated useful lives. Useful life considered for calculation of depreciation for investment properties is as follows :

VI. INTANGIBLE ASSETS

The Company has elected to continue with the carrying value of intangible assets recognized as of transition date measured as per the previous IGAAP and use that carrying value as its deemed cost as on the transition date.

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. After initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses.

Software (not being an integral part of the related hardware) acquired for internal use are treated as intangible assets and is amortized over a period of 6 years on straight line method over estimated useful life.

An item of Intangible asset is derecognized on disposal or when no future economical benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any profit or loss arising from derecognition of an intangible asset is determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

VII. IMPAIRMENT OF TANGIBLE (PPE) AND INTANGIBLE ASSETS

At the end of each reporting period, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its PPE and other intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that these assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss. Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit (CGU) to which the asset belongs. When the carrying amount of an asset or CGU exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount. The resulting impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. In determining fair value less costs of disposal, recent markets transactions are taken into account. If no such transactions can be identified, an appropriate valuation model is used.

VIII. CONTRACT BALANCES

Trade Receivables:

Trade receivables are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

A provision for impairment for trade receivables is recognised when there is objective evidence that the Company will not be able to collect all amounts due under the original terms of receivables. When receivable is deemed uncollectible it is written off. Any subsequent recovery of previous written off amounts is recognised in the income statement.

Contract liabilities:

A contract liability is the obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the company has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer. If a customer pays consideration before the company transfer goods and services to the customer, a contract liability is recognised when the payment is made or the payment is due, whichever is earlier.

Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the company performs under the contract.

IX. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, cheque in hand, drafts on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

NOTES TO THE STANDALONE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026**X. INVENTORIES**

Inventories are valued after providing for obsolescence as follows:

- (1) Raw materials, components, stores and spares are valued at lower of cost and net realizable value. However materials and other items held for use in the production of inventories are not written down below cost if the finished products in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above cost. Cost Formulae used is first in first out. Cost includes cost of purchase and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.
- (2) Semi-Finished Goods are valued at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost for the purpose includes material cost, labour and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on normal operating capacity. Cost Formulae used is weighted average method.
- (3) Stock of manufactured and finished goods are valued at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost for the purpose includes material cost, labour and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on normal operating capacity. Goods in transit are stated at cost.
- (4) Goods for re-sale are valued at lower of cost or net realizable value.
- (5) Due allowance is estimated and made for defective and obsolete items, wherever necessary, based on the past experience of the company.

XI. INVESTMENTS AND OTHER FINANCIAL ASSETS**a. Classification-**

The Company classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- (1) those to be measured subsequently at fair value (either through other comprehensive income, or through the Statement of Profit and Loss), and
- (2) those measured at amortized cost.

The classification depends on the Company's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows.

b. Measurement

At initial recognition, the Company measures a financial asset at its fair value. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at fair value through the Profit and Loss are expensed in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

c. Derecognition of Financial Assets

The company derecognizes a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expires or when it transfers the financial assets and substantially all risks and rewards of the ownership of the assets to another party.

d. Impairment of Financial Assets

The impairment provisions for Financial Assets are based on assumptions about risk of default and expected cash loss rates. The Company uses judgement in making these assumptions and selecting the inputs to the impairment calculation, based on Company's past history, existing market conditions as well as forward-looking estimates at the end of each reporting period.

e. Derivative financial instruments and hedge accounting

Derivative financial instruments such as forward contracts, option contracts and cross currency swaps, to hedge its foreign currency risks are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at their fair value with changes in fair value recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period when they arise.

XII. FINANCIAL LIABILITIES**a. Measurement**

Borrowings, trade payables and other financial liabilities are initially recognised at the value of the respective contractual obligations. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Any discount or premium on redemption / settlement is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss as finance cost over the life of the liability using the effective interest method and adjusted to the liability figure disclosed in the Balance Sheet.

NOTES TO THE STANDALONE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026**b. Derecognition of financial liabilities**

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the liability is extinguished, that is, when the contractual obligation is discharged, cancelled and on expiry. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

XIII. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENT

The company measures financial instruments such as derivatives and equity instruments at fair value at each balance sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumptions that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

XIV. INVESTMENTS IN SUBSIDIARIES

Investments in subsidiaries are recognized at cost as per Ind AS 27 except when those are required to be accounted as per Ind AS 105 Non-Current Assets held for Sale and Discontinued Operations.

XV. REVENUE RECOGNITION

The company derives revenues primarily from sale of goods comprising of dyes, pigment and ink and inkjet printers.

Revenue is recognized upon transfer of control of promised products or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration the Company expects to receive in exchange for those products or services.

Revenues are recognized at a point in time when control of the goods passes to the buyer, usually upon either at the time of dispatch or delivery. In case of export sale, it is usually recognised based on the shipped-on board date as per shipping bill. Revenue from sale of goods is net of taxes and recovery of charges collected from customers like transport, packing etc.

Revenue is measured based on the transaction price, which is the consideration, adjusted for turnover discounts to customer as specified in the contract with the customers.

Use of significant judgements in revenue recognition.

Judgement is also required to determine the transaction price for the contract. The transaction price could be either a fixed amount of consideration or variable consideration with elements such as turnover discounts. Any consideration payable to the customer is adjusted to the transaction price, unless it is a payment for a distinct product or service from the customer. The estimated amount of variable consideration is adjusted in the transaction price only to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognized will not occur and is reassessed at the end of each reporting period.

Sale of scrap is accounted for as and when the sale is completed and its collection is reasonably certain.

Export incentives are recognised as income of the year on accrual basis. In case of utilisation for Import purpose the same is recognised as raw material cost in the year of import.

Dividend Income is accounted for when the right to receive the same is established, which is generally when shareholders approve the dividend.

Interest Income on financial assets measured at amortised cost is recognised on a time-proportion basis using the effective interest method.

XVI. EMPLOYEE BENEFITS**a. Short term obligation**

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service are recognized in respect of employees' services up to the end of the reporting period and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

NOTES TO THE STANDALONE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026**b. Post-employment obligations**

The Company provides the following post-employment benefits:

(a) Defined Benefits Plans

The cost of providing defined benefit plans such as gratuity is determined on the basis of present value of defined benefits obligation which is computed using the projected unit credit method with independent actuarial valuation made at the end of each annual reporting period, which recognizes each period of service as giving rise to additional unit of employee benefit entitlement and measuring each unit separately to build up the final obligation.

The net interest cost is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net balance of defined benefit obligation and the fair value of plan asset. This cost is included in employee benefit expenses in the statement of Profit and Loss except those included in the cost of asset as permitted.

Re-measurements comprising of actuarial gain and losses arising from experience adjustments and change in actuarial assumptions, the effect of change in assets ceiling (if applicable) and the return on the plan asset (excluding net interest define above) are recognized in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI) except those included in cost of asset as permitted in the period in which they occur. Re-measurements are not reclassified to the Statement of Profit and Loss in subsequent periods.

Service cost (including current service cost, past service cost, as well as gains and losses on curtailments and settlement) is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss except those included in cost of asset as permitted in the period in which they occur.

(b) Defined Contribution Plan

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans, viz. Provident Fund and National Pension Fund for eligible employees are recognized as an expense when employees have rendered the service entitling them to the contribution.

XVII. FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSLATIONS**a. Functional and presentation currency**

The financial statements are presented in Indian rupee (₹), which is Company's functional and presentation currency.

b. Transactions and Balances

Transactions in foreign currencies are recognised at the prevailing exchange rates on the transaction dates. Realised gains and losses on settlement of foreign currency transactions are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Monetary foreign currency assets and liabilities at the year-end are translated at the year-end exchange rates and the resultant exchange differences are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income. Non – monetary assets and liabilities that are measured in terms of historical cost in foreign currencies are not translated thereafter.

XVIII. PROVISIONS AND CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND CONTINGENT ASSETS

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and the amount can be reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period. These are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

Contingent liabilities are disclosed on the basis of judgment of management/independent experts. The timing of recognition and quantification of the liability (including litigations) requires the application of judgement to existing facts and circumstances, which can be subject to change.

The carrying amounts of provisions and liabilities are reviewed regularly and revised to take account of changing facts and circumstances.

Contingent Assets are not recognized, however, disclosed in financial statement when inflow of economic benefits is probable.

NOTES TO THE STANDALONE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026

Litigations : From time to time, the company is subjected to legal proceedings, the ultimate outcome of each being always subject to many uncertainties, inherent in litigations. A provision is made when it is considered probable that payment will be made and the amount of loss can be reasonably estimated significant judgment is made when evaluating among other factors the probability of unfavorable outcome and ability to make a reasonable estimate of the amount of potential loss litigation provisions are reviewed at each accounting year and revisions made for changes in facts and circumstances.

XIX. INCOME TAX

Income Tax expenses represent the sum of tax currently payable and deferred tax. Tax is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognized directly in equity or in other comprehensive income.

Current Tax includes provision for Income Tax computed under Special provision (i.e. Minimum alternate tax) or normal provision of Income Tax Act. Tax on Income for the Current year is determined on the basis of the estimated taxable income and tax credit computed in accordance with the provisions of the relevant tax laws and based on expected outcome of assessment/appeals.

Deferred tax is recognized on the temporary differences between the carrying amounts of the assets and liabilities in the balance sheet and corresponding tax bases use in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognized for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognized for all deductible temporary differences, unabsorbed losses and unabsorbed depreciation to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which those deductible temporary differences, unabsorbed losses and unabsorbed depreciation can be utilized. Such deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognized if the temporary difference arises from initial recognition of assets and liabilities in the transaction that effect neither taxable profit nor accounting profit.

Deferred tax asset and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset is realized, based on tax rate (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

XX. EARNING PER SHARE

The basic and diluted earnings per share is computed by dividing the Profit after tax attributable to equity shareholders for the year, by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

XXI. STATEMENT OF CASH FLOW

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method where by the profit before tax is adjusted for the effect of the transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals or accruals of past and future operating cash receipts or payments and items of income or expenses associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the company are segregated for presentations in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents does not includes cash credit and over draft facility.

XXII. PROPOSED DIVIDEND

The Company recognizes a liability to pay dividend when the distribution is authorized and the distribution is no longer at the discretion of the Company i.e. when the dividend distribution is being approved by the shareholders. A corresponding amount is recognized directly in equity.

XXIII. BUSINESS COMBINATION UNDER COMMON CONTROL

Business combinations involving entities or businesses under common control are accounted for using the pooling of interest method. Under pooling of interest method, the assets and liabilities of the combining entities or businesses are reflected at their carrying amounts after making adjustments necessary to harmonise the accounting policies. The company has one class of equity shares having a par value of ₹ 1/- per share. Each shareholder is eligible for one vote per share held. The Dividend when proposed by the Board of Directors is subject to the approval of the shareholders in the Annual General Meeting except in case of interim dividend. In the event of liquidation, the equity shareholders are eligible to receive the assets of the company remaining after distribution of all preferential amounts in proportion of their shareholding.

E) Terms / rights attached to Preference Shareholders:

The Preference Shares have a face value of ₹ 1 per Preference Share.

The Preference Shares are non-cumulative in nature and non-convertible.

The Preference Shares holders have a right to a fixed preferential dividend of 2% per annum in priority to the dividend, if any, payable to equity shares subject to deduction of taxes at source if applicable. The Preference Shares shall not be entitled to participate in any profits in addition to the coupon rate mentioned above.

The holder of Preference Share shall have the right to vote in accordance with Section 47 of the Companies Act, 2013.

The Redemption of Preference shares shall be as per following terms:

- ₹ 6 Crore shall be redeemed on 31st March of every year commencing from 31st March 2025 till 31st March 2033.
- In the interim period between 31st March 2025 to 31st March 2033, in case of sale of any capital asset, being investment property or property, plant and equipment (as disclosed in the PPE Schedule), as held by the Transferor Companies and Transferee Company, upto 75% of such realisation proceeds (net of taxes, as applicable) shall be utilised towards redemption of the preference shares, subject to provisions of the Companies Act, 2013. This clause is applicable only if the realisation proceeds on sale of capital asset (net of taxes, as applicable) exceeds ₹ 3.5 Crores in the given financial years.
- The balance amount, if any, after giving effect to clause (i) and (ii) above, if any, shall be redeemed by the Company on 31st March 2034, as a final redemption of the preference shares.
- In the event of winding up of the Transferee Company, the holders of Preference Shares shall have a right to receive repayment of the capital paid-up and arrears of dividend, whether declared or not, up to the commencement of winding up, in priority to any payment of capital on the equity shares out of the surplus of the Transferee Company but shall not have any further right to participate in the profits or assets of the Transferee Company.

On November 21, 2025, the Government of India notified four Labour Codes effective immediately, replacing the then existing 29 labour laws. In accordance with Ind AS 19 - Employee benefits, changes to employee benefit plans arising from legislative amendments are treated as plan amendments, requiring immediate recognition of changes in the past service cost in the standalone financial results. This approach is consistent with the guidance issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. The Company had assessed the impact of these changes and provided an amount of ₹ 102.07 lakhs and recognised the same for the quarter and nine months ended on December 31, 2025, as employee benefit expenses. Consequent to the employee compensation restructuring and on actuarial valuation, the said liability is now determined at ₹ 97.28 lakhs. Opinion

These consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (herein after referred to as the 'Ind AS') as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ('Act') read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended) and relevant provisions of the Act and the guidelines issued by the Securities and Exchange Board of India ('SEBI'), to the extent applicable. The accounting policies are applied consistently for all periods presented in the financial statements.

B) Basis of preparation and presentation

These Financial Statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for following assets and liabilities which have been measured at fair value amount like

- i) Certain Financial Assets and Liabilities (including derivative instruments),
- ii) Defined Benefit Plans – Plan Assets
- iii) Leases
- iv) Any other item as specifically stated in respective accounting policy.

C) Current and Non-Current Classification

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the Balance Sheet based on Current/ Non-Current classification. An asset is treated as Current when it is –

- Expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle;
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle;
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

The Company classifies all other liabilities as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026**D) Principles of Consolidation**

Subsidiary is an entity over which the Holding company has control. Subsidiary is fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Holding company.

The acquisition method of accounting is used to account for business combination by the Group. The Group combines the financial statements of the Holding Company and its subsidiary line by line adding together like items of assets, liabilities, equity, income and expenses and cash flows. Offset (eliminate) the carrying amount of the parent's investment in each subsidiary and the parent's portion of equity of each subsidiary. Goodwill or Capital Reserve on such consolidation is recognized accordingly.

Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealized gains on transactions between Group companies are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the transferred asset. Accounting policies of subsidiary are changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the Group.

II. USE OF ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The preparation of the consolidated financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires Management to make estimates, judgements and assumptions. These estimates, judgements and assumptions affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Examples of such estimates include useful lives of tangible and intangible assets, provision for doubtful debts, future obligations in respect of retirement benefit plans, considering the extension period for determination of lease term, etc. Accounting estimates could change from period to period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Appropriate changes in estimates are made as management becomes aware of changes in circumstances surrounding the estimates. Changes in estimates are reflected in the consolidated financial statements in the period in which changes are made and, if material, their effects are disclosed in the notes to the consolidated financial statements.

The estimates and judgments used in the preparation of the financial statements are continuously evaluated by the company and are based on historical experience and various other assumptions and factors (including expectations of future events) that the company believes to be reasonable under the existing circumstances, difference between actual and results and estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known/materialized .

The said estimates are based on the facts and events that existed as at the reporting date, or that occurred after that date but provide additional evidence about condition existing as at the reporting date.

III. PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

The Company has elected to continue with the carrying value of Property, Plant and Equipment ('PPE') recognized as of transition date measured as per the Previous IGAAP and use that carrying value as its deemed cost of the PPE as on the transition date.

All items of property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment, if any. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the assets to its working condition. Estimates are involved in determining the cost attributable to bringing the assets to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by the management.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognized when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during the reporting period in which they are incurred.

Spare parts procured along with the Plant and Equipment or subsequently individually which meets the recognition criteria of PPE are capitalized and added to the carrying amount of such items. The carrying amounts of those spare parts that are replaced are derecognized when no future economic benefits are expected from their use or upon disposal.

*The company has estimated the useful life of the factory building as for 18 years on the basis of technical advice & has provided depreciation for the current year on straight line method on carrying amount as on 01st April, 2015 of that asset so that the said asset gets depreciated over its remaining useful life.

Lease hold Land is amortised over the lease period of 95 years. Depreciation on all property plant and equipment is provided on straight line basis.

The residual values are not more than 5% of the original cost of the asset. The assets residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

Depreciation on property plant and equipment added/disposed off during the year is provided on pro rata basis with reference to the date of addition/disposal.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

IV. LEASES

The Company, as a lessee, recognises a right to use asset and a lease liability for its leasing arrangements, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset. The contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, if it involves the use of an identified asset and the Company has substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the asset and has right to direct the use of the identified asset.

The cost of the right to use asset shall comprise of the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date plus any initial direct costs incurred. The right to use assets is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation, accumulated impairment losses, if any and adjusted for any remeasurement of the lease liability. The right to use asset is depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date over the shorter of lease term or useful life of right to use asset.

The Company measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date of the lease. The lease payments are discounted by using the interest rate implicit in the lease, if that rate can be readily determined. If that rate cannot be readily determined, the Company uses incremental borrowing rate.

The company didn't recognize Right to Use and Lease liabilities for lease for which the lease terms ends within 12 months on the date of initial transition and low value assets.

As exemption is given under Ind AS 116 leases instead of recognizing a right to use asset and lease liability the payments in relation to these are recognized as an expenses in profit and loss on a straight – line basis over the lease term.

Due to transition, the nature of expenses in respect of operating leases has changed from “lease rent” to “depreciation cost” and “finance cost” for the right-to-use assets and for interest accrued on lease liability respectively, and therefore, these expenses for the current year are not comparable to the previous years, to that extent.

V. INVESTMENT PROPERTIES

Property that is held for long-term rental yields or for capital appreciation or both, and that is not occupied by the Company, is classified as investment properties. The Company has elected to continue with the carrying value of all of its investment property recognized as of transition date measured as per IGAAP as the deemed cost of investment property.

Upon initial recognition, an investment property is measured at cost. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment property is measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Investment properties are depreciated using the straight line method over their estimated useful lives. Useful life considered for calculation of depreciation for investment properties is as follows:

VI. INTANGIBLE ASSETS

The Company has elected to continue with the carrying value of intangible assets recognized as of transition date measured as per the previous IGAAP and use that carrying value as its deemed cost as on the transition date.

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. After initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses.

Software (not being an integral part of the related hardware) acquired for internal use are treated as intangible assets and is amortized over a period of 6 years on straight line method over estimated useful life.

An item of Intangible asset is derecognized on disposal or when no future economical benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any profit or loss arising from derecognition of an intangible asset is determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Goodwill on acquisition of subsidiary is included in intangible assets. Goodwill is not amortised but is tested for impairment annually, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that it might be impaired, and is carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses.

VII. IMPAIRMENT OF TANGIBLE (PPE) AND INTANGIBLE ASSETS

At the end of each reporting period, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its PPE and other intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that these assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss. Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit (CGU) to which the asset belongs. When the carrying amount of an asset or CGU exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount. The resulting impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre- tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. In determining fair value less costs of disposal, recent markets transactions are taken into account. If no such transactions can be identified, an appropriate valuation model is used.

Goodwill that has an indefinite useful life is not subject to amortisation and tested annually for impairment, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that they might be impaired.

VIII. CONTRACT BALANCES

Trade Receivables:

Trade receivables are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

A provision for impairment for trade receivables is recognised when there is objective evidence that the Company will not be able to collect all amounts due under the original terms of receivables. When receivable is deemed uncollectible it is written off. Any subsequent recovery of previous written off amounts is recognised in the income statement.

Contract liabilities:

A contract liability is the obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the company has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer. If a customer pays consideration before the company transfer goods and services to the customer, a contract liability is recognised when the payment is made or the payment is due, whichever is earlier.

Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the company performs under the contract.

IX. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, cheque in hand, drafts on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

X. INVENTORIES

Inventories are valued after providing for obsolescence as follows:

- (1) Raw materials, components, stores and spares are valued at lower of cost and net realizable value. However materials and other items held for use in the production of inventories are not written down below cost if the finished products in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above cost. Cost Formulae used is first in first out. Cost includes cost of purchase and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.
- (2) Semi-Finished Goods are valued at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost for the purpose includes material cost, labour and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on normal operating capacity. Cost Formulae used is weighted average method.
- (3) Stock of manufactured and finished goods are valued at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost for the purpose includes material cost, labour and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on normal operating capacity. Goods In transit are stated at cost.
- (4) Goods for re-sale are valued at lower of cost or net realizable value.
- (5) Due allowance is estimated and made for defective and obsolete items, wherever necessary, based on the past experience of the company.

XI. INVESTMENTS AND OTHER FINANCIAL ASSETS

A. Classification-

The Company classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- (1) those to be measured subsequently at fair value (either through other comprehensive income, or through the Statement of Profit and Loss), and
- (2) those measured at amortized cost.

The classification depends on the Company's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows.

B. Measurement

At initial recognition, the Company measures a financial asset at its fair value. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at fair value through the Profit and Loss are expensed in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026**C. Derecognition of Financial Assets**

The company derecognizes a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expires or when it transfers the financial assets and substantially all risks and rewards of the ownership of the assets to another party.

D. Impairment of Financial Assets

The impairment provisions for Financial Assets are based on assumptions about risk of default and expected cash loss rates. The Company uses judgement in making these assumptions and selecting the inputs to the impairment calculation, based on Company's past history, existing market conditions as well as forward-looking estimates at the end of each reporting period.

E. Derivative financial instruments and hedge accounting

Derivative financial instruments such as forward contracts, option contracts and cross currency swaps, to hedge its foreign currency risks are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at their fair value with changes in fair value recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period when they arise.

XII. FINANCIAL LIABILITIES**A. Measurement**

Borrowings, trade payables and other financial liabilities are initially recognised at the value of the respective contractual obligations. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Any discount or premium on redemption / settlement is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss as finance cost over the life of the liability using the effective interest method and adjusted to the liability figure disclosed in the Balance Sheet.

B. Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the liability is extinguished, that is, when the contractual obligation is discharged, cancelled and on expiry. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

XIII. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENT

The company measures financial instruments such as derivatives and equity instruments at fair value at each balance sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumptions that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

XIV. REVENUE RECOGNITION

The company derives revenues primarily from sale of goods comprising of dyes, pigment and ink and inkjet printers.

Revenue is recognized upon transfer of control of promised products or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration the Company expects to receive in exchange for those products or services.

Revenues are recognized at a point in time when control of the goods passes to the buyer, usually upon either at the time of dispatch or delivery. In case of export sale, it is usually recognised based on the shipped-on board date as per shipping bill. Revenue from sale of goods is net of taxes and recovery of charges collected from customers like transport, packing etc.

Revenue is measured based on the transaction price, which is the consideration, adjusted for turnover discounts to customer as specified in the contract with the customers.

Use of significant judgements in revenue recognition.

Judgement is also required to determine the transaction price for the contract. The transaction price could be either a fixed amount of consideration or variable consideration with elements such as turnover discounts. Any consideration payable to the customer is adjusted to the transaction price, unless it is a payment for a distinct product or service from the customer. The estimated amount of variable consideration is adjusted in the transaction price only to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognized will not occur and is reassessed at the end of each reporting period.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026

Sale of scrap is accounted for as and when the sale is completed and its collection is reasonably certain.

Export incentives are recognised as income of the year on accrual basis. In case of utilisation for Import purpose the same is recognised as raw material cost in the year of import.

Dividend Income is accounted for when the right to receive the same is established, which is generally when shareholders approve the dividend.

Interest Income on financial assets measured at amortised cost is recognised on a time-proportion basis using the effective interest method.

XV. EMPLOYEE BENEFITS**A. Short term obligation**

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service are recognized in respect of employees' services up to the end of the reporting period and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

B. Post-employment obligations

The Company provides the following post-employment benefits:

a. Defined Benefits Plans

The cost of providing defined benefit plans such as gratuity is determined on the basis of present value of defined benefits obligation which is computed using the projected unit credit method with independent actuarial valuation made at the end of each annual reporting period, which recognizes each period of service as giving rise to additional unit of employee benefit entitlement and measuring each unit separately to build up the final obligation.

The net interest cost is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net balance of defined benefit obligation and the fair value of plan asset. This cost is included in employee benefit expenses in the statement of Profit and Loss except those included in the cost of asset as permitted.

Re-measurements comprising of actuarial gain and losses arising from experience adjustments and change in actuarial assumptions, the effect of change in assets ceiling (if applicable) and the return on the plan asset (excluding net interest define above) are recognized in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI) except those included in cost of asset as permitted in the period in which they occur. Re-measurements are not reclassified to the Statement of Profit and Loss in subsequent periods.

Service cost (including current service cost, past service cost, as well as gains and losses on curtailments and settlement) is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss except those included in cost of asset as permitted in the period in which they occur.

b. Defined Contribution Plans

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans, viz. Provident Fund and National Pension Fund for eligible employees are recognized as an expense when employees have rendered the service entitling them to the contribution.

XVI. FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSLATIONS**A. Functional and presentation currency**

The consolidated financial statements are presented in Indian rupee (₹), which is Company's functional and presentation currency.

On Consolidation, exchange differences arising from the translation of any net investment in foreign entity is recognised in foreign fluctuation reserve.

B. Transactions and Balances

Transactions in foreign currencies are recognised at the prevailing exchange rates on the transaction dates. Realised gains and losses on settlement of foreign currency transactions are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Monetary foreign currency assets and liabilities at the year-end are translated at the year-end exchange rates and the resultant exchange differences are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income. Non – monetary assets and liabilities that are measured in terms of historical cost in foreign currencies are not translated thereafter.

XVII. PROVISIONS AND CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND CONTINGENT ASSETS

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and the amount can be reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period. These are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

Contingent liabilities are disclosed on the basis of judgement of management/independent experts. The timing of recognition and quantification of the liability (including litigations) requires the application of judgement to existing facts and circumstances, which can be subject to change.

The carrying amounts of provisions and liabilities are reviewed regularly and revised to take account of changing facts and circumstances.

Contingent Assets are not recognized, however, disclosed in financial statement when inflow of economic benefits is probable.

Litigations : From time to time, the company is subjected to legal proceedings, the ultimate outcome of each being always subject to many uncertainties, inherent in litigations. A provision is made when it is considered probable that payment will be made and the amount of loss can be reasonably estimated significant judgment is made when evaluating among other factors the probability of unfavorable outcome and ability to make a reasonable estimate of the amount of potential loss litigation provisions are reviewed at each accounting year and revisions made for changes in facts and circumstances.

XVIII. INCOME TAX

Income Tax expenses represent the sum of tax currently payable and deferred tax. Tax is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognized directly in equity or in other comprehensive income.

Current Tax includes provision for Income Tax computed under Special provision (i.e. Minimum alternate tax) or normal provision of Income Tax Act. Tax on Income for the Current year is determined on the basis of the estimated taxable income and tax credit computed in accordance with the provisions of the relevant tax laws and based on expected outcome of assessment/appeals.

Deferred tax is recognized on the temporary differences between the carrying amounts of the assets and liabilities in the balance sheet and corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognized for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognized for all deductible temporary differences, unabsorbed losses and unabsorbed depreciation to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which those deductible temporary differences, unabsorbed losses and unabsorbed depreciation can be utilized. Such deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognized if the temporary difference arises from initial recognition of assets and liabilities in the transaction that effect neither taxable profit nor accounting profit.

Deferred tax asset and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset is realized, based on tax rate (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

XIX. EARNING PER SHARE

The basic and diluted earnings per share is computed by dividing the Profit after tax attributable to equity shareholders for the year, by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

XX. STATEMENT OF CASH FLOW

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method where by the profit before tax is adjusted for the effect of the transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals or accruals of past and future operating cash receipts or payments and items of income or expenses associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the company are segregated for presentations in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents does not includes cash credit and over draft facility.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026**XXI. PROPOSED DIVIDEND**

The Company recognizes a liability to pay dividend when the distribution is authorized and the distribution is no longer at the discretion of the Company i.e. when the dividend distribution is being approved by the shareholders. A corresponding amount is recognized directly in equity.

XXII. BUSINESS COMBINATION UNDER COMMON CONTROL

Business combinations involving entities or businesses under common control are accounted for using the pooling of interest method. Under pooling of interest method, the assets and liabilities of the combining entities or businesses are reflected at their carrying amounts after making adjustments necessary to harmonise the accounting policies. The identity of the reserves is preserved in the same form in which they appeared in the financial statements of the transferor and the difference, if any, between the amount recorded as share capital issued plus any additional consideration in the form of cash or other assets and the amount of share capital of the transferor is transferred to capital reserve.

XXIII. EXCEPTIONAL ITEMS

When items of income and expenses within statement of profit and loss from ordinary activity are of such size, nature or incidence that disclosure is relevant to explain the performance of the enterprise for the period, the nature and amount of such material items are disclosed separately as exceptional items.

XXIV. RECENT INDIAN ACCOUNTING STANDARDS (Ind AS)

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. D) Terms / rights attached to Equity Shareholders:

The company has one class of equity shares having a par value of ₹ 1/- per share. Each shareholder is eligible for one vote per share held. The Dividend when proposed by the Board of Directors is subject to the approval of the shareholders in the Annual General Meeting except in case of interim dividend. In the event of liquidation, the equity shareholders are eligible to receive the assets of the company remaining after distribution of all preferential amounts in proportion of their shareholding.

E) Terms / rights attached to Preference Shareholders:

The Preference Shares have a face value of ₹ 1 per Preference Share.

The Preference Shares are non-cumulative in nature and non-convertible.

The Preference Shares holders have a right to a fixed preferential dividend of 2% per annum in priority to the dividend, if any, payable to equity shares subject to deduction of taxes at source if applicable. The Preference Shares shall not be entitled to participate in any profits in addition to the coupon rate mentioned above.

The holder of Preference Share shall have the right to vote in accordance with Section 47 of the Companies Act, 2013.

The Redemption of Preference shares shall be as per following terms:

- ₹ 6 Crore shall be redeemed on 31st March of every year commencing from 31st March 2025 till 31st March 2033.
- In the interim period between 31st March 2025 to 31st March 2033, in case of sale of any capital asset, being investment property or property, plant and equipment (as disclosed in the PPE Schedule), as held by the Transferor Companies and Transferee Company, upto 75% of such realisation proceeds (net of taxes, as applicable) shall be utilised towards redemption of the preference shares, subject to provisions of the Companies Act, 2013. This clause is applicable only if the realisation proceeds on sale of capital asset (net of taxes, as applicable) exceeds ₹ 3.5 Crores in the given financial years.
- The balance amount, if any, after giving effect to clause (i) and (ii) above, if any, shall be redeemed by the Company on 31st March 2034, as a final redemption of the preference shares.
- In the event of winding up of the Transferee Company, the holders of Preference Shares shall have a right to receive repayment of the capital paid-up and arrears of dividend, whether declared or not, up to the commencement of winding up, in priority to any payment of capital on the equity shares out of the surplus of the Transferee Company but shall not have any further right to participate in the profits or assets of the Transferee Company.

On November 21, 2025, the Government of India notified four Labour Codes, effective immediately, replacing the then existing 29 labour laws. In accordance with Ind AS 19 - Employee benefits, changes to employee benefit plans arising from legislative amendments are treated as plan amendments, requiring immediate recognition of changes in the past service cost in the consolidated financial results. This approach is consistent with the guidance issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. The Company had assessed the impact of these changes and provided an amount of ₹ 102.07 lakhs and recognised the same for the quarter and nine months ended on December 31, 2025, as employee benefit expenses. Consequent to the employee compensation restructuring and on actuarial valuation, the said liability is now determined at ₹ 97.28 lakhs. The excess provision of ₹ 4.79 lakhs has been reversed in the results for the quarter and year ended March 31, 2026, as a change in estimate. The Company continues to monitor the finalisation of the Central and State rules and the clarifications that may be issued by the Government on the new labour codes and will recognise the impact of changes in the estimates in that period, as needed.
